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




A modern Logistics Trade (c. 500 B.C.)





Customs Wall at Palmyra Syria Desert (137 A.D.)






The Oldest Customs Tariff

First column

- § 1 From those who import male slaves into Tadmor or its territory, the Customs agent («publicanus») shall collect twenty-two denarii per slave.
- § 2 For each slave exported, twenty-two denarii.
- § 5 The Customs agent himself shall levy a duty in respect of each camel-load: three denarii for each camel-load entering Tadmor, and three denarii for each camel-load leaving Tadmor.
- § 6 For each donkey-load imported or exported, he shall collect one denarius.
- § 7 Wool dyed purple. For each fleece imported or exported, three denarii.
- § 8 For each camel-load of aromatic oil imported in alabaster jars, twenty-five denarii.
- § 9 For exports of this oil by camel, thirteen denarii per load.
- § 10 Per camel-load of aromatic oil in goatskin bags, thirteen denarii at importation and exportation.
- § 11 Per donkey-load of aromatic oil in alabaster jars, seven denarii at importation and exportation.
- § 12 Per donkey-load of aromatic oil in goatskin bags, four denarii at importation and exportation.
- § 13 Per camel-load of olive oil comprising four goatskin bags, ten denarii at importation and exportation.
- § 14 Per camel-load of olive oil comprising two goatskin bags,
- (?) denarii at importation and (?) denarii at exportation.
- § 15 Per donkey-load of olive oil, seven denarii at importation and exportation.


